# Key bibliographical tools for Historians

**Bibliographical databases** are one of the best tools for **locating journal articles, book reviews, collections of essays and conference proceedings** even if you don't know the authors or article. In this task you can explore two of the most important history ones: **Historical Abstracts** and/or **Bibliography of British and Irish History**.

You will **search for an article by subject,** locate the **full-text** in the Oxford library system and learn how to **save the citations**.

## **Using Historical Abstracts**

- **Go to the SOLO homepage (<u>http://solo.bodleian.ox.ac.uk</u>)**
- Click Databases A-Z (under Useful Links on the right), and find *Historical Abstracts*. Alternatively, you can search SOLO for the title of the database.

Historical Abstracts indexes journal publications since 1954 on the history of the world from 1450 to the present (excluding the United States and Canada, which are covered in *America: History and Life*). Includes dissertations and some book reviews.

- **Connect to Historical Abstracts.**
- Search for articles on the subject of *poor law* in the 19<sup>th</sup> century
  - Type **poor law** in the first search box
  - Select **Subject Terms** as the search field.

- Who did the author research?
- **L** Email the citation to yourself
- └ Try and find the electronic full-text **Find it©**oxford
- **Solution** Now try and find a printed copy via SOLO.
  - o Again, click on Find it Ooxford
  - o Chose SOLO
  - o Look at Physical Resources only
  - Look at **Find & Request** for information which library or reading room holds the title and write down where you might go to access it.

# Using Bibliography of British & Irish History

- From the SOLO homepage, go to Databases A-Z and find *Bibliography of British & Irish History*. Alternatively, you can search SOLO for the title of the database.
  - (note: medievalists could also try the International Medieval Bibliography)

BBIH is a comprehensive bibliography to historical writing about the history of Britain, Ireland, and relations with the empire and Commonwealth from 55BC to the present. Indexes articles, books, essays published since 1901.

- Only has license for 3 concurrent users. If you can't access it, try again later.

  - Click on **Advanced Search**.

## **Search for articles published by Richard Sharpe**

- How many are there in total?
- Control Refine the search to find only articles published since 2010 and look at the full display
  - o Click **Refine Search**.
  - In the search form, limit the search to publications after 2010.
  - Of the remaining articles see if the article 'Iona in 1771' is available electronically.
- **L** Email the references to yourself
  - Select any or all articles for emailing.
  - Click on **Export**.
  - Select **email** as the method of export.
  - Enter your email address and chose output format.
