Prerequisites

About this workshop

This class will give you an insight into some of the techniques that Audacity facilitates in creating spoken word recordings for uses such as podcasting. It will introduce a workflow of: planning, recording, editing, saving and publishing content which will be useful across all your media work.

Audacity is a free, easy-to-use multi-track audio recorder and editor for Windows, Mac OS X and other operating systems. You can use Audacity to:

Record live audio.

Trim and edit your recordings.

Audacity is a free software, developed by a group of volunteers and distributed under the GNU General Public Licence (GPL)

What you will learn

How to record and edit spoken word in Audacity. How to find and save still images on Unsplash. How to upload and edit both audio and images in Adobe Rush and finally how to publish your podcast on MediaPub.




About IT Customer Services

https://unsplash.com/ What is your topic/theme? Choose approx. 5 images Create a new folder 'Podcast resources' on the desktop and save images in it. Write a bullet point for each image Create a 1 minute script.

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
It's time to record!

Attach headset Open Audacity - select do . your USB headset Select the mic in the record meter . to check input/output is set to select the mic in the record meter . to start monitoring sound Hit RECORD button to start SPEAK :- be yourself Hit STOP button to pause or finish Save Project As: EXAMPLE.aup













Put it all together (pt.2)

- Navigate to the Podcast resources (on Desktop)
- Select the MP3 audio file
- Click Create
- Your project will open with the audio file in the project timeline



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Put it all together (pt.3)

- Click the 軠 icon
- Select your pictures in chronological order and click
- The pictures will appear in the project timeline above the audio track



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Put it all together (pt.4)

- Play through the audio track and stretch the first image to increase its duration to fit the narration
- Continue process for each picture
- Use + or keys to zoom







Put it all together (pt.5)

- Position the Playhead at start of Timeline
- Click the Graphics Icon, Item Click Add Graphic
- Choose Titles from thedropdown menu, choose
- a title and click



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Put it all together (pt.6)

- The title will appear above the first picture in the Timeline
- Edit the title text, size, font, etc.
- Drag Title to position it and shrink/stretch as required



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Put it all together (pt.7)

- Position Playhead at end of Timeline
- Click the Graphics icon, then click Add Graphic
 Choose Overlay from the
- dropdown menu, choose one and click
- Double click on text to edit





Put it all together (pt.8)

Click the Share tab in the top left



location, quality, etc.
Click Export in the bottom right

Choose file name, save

- Your video (MP4) will render
- Playback/save when complete

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


